Train named after rugby league legend and MND campaigner Rob Burrow is unveiled

We've named one of our Class 195 trains after Rob Burrow, the inspirational rugby league icon and tireless campaigner for motor neurone disease (MND). The train, unveiled at Castleford station on Rob's birthday, features artwork across two carriages and a timeline of his incredible achievements.

Working closely with Rob's family and the MND Association, we created a moving tribute that celebrates his life and raises awareness of MND, a condition affecting over 5,000 people in the UK.

Rob's wife Lindsey, their children Maya and Jackson and his parents Geoff and Irene joined us for the unveiling. Lindsey shared how honoured they were, saying Rob's legacy of courage, love, and advocacy continues to inspire.

Rob, who passed away in June 2024 at age 41, won countless titles with Leeds Rhinos and spent his final years raising millions for MND research alongside friend Kevin Sinfield. This tribute was driven by our colleagues, Wakefield Council, and West Yorkshire Mayor Tracy Brabin, who all recognised Rob's impact. As Tanya Curry from the MND Association said, this train is a powerful way to remember Rob's sporting achievements and his support for the MND community.

We've also partnered with the MND Association, and our teams are committed to raising thousands for research and care.

& Lumo services will also be impacted.



Planned Closure of York Station Ahead of Engineering Works

Services will run on an amended timetable through York between 25th October and 23rd November as Network Rail carries out major engineering works. The work involves updating and renewing tracks, improving drainage and resurfacing crossings, and is necessary to further improve our services for customers.

The station closure on each of the weekends between the 25th of October and 23rd November means rail replacement buses will run between York and Leeds, Darlington, Redcar, Selby, Doncaster and Wakefield.

There will also be no Cross Country, LNER or TransPennine Express services stopping in York on the above dates, with the exception of a reduced TransPennine service between York and Scarborough.

REVEALED: Top 10 destinations in Northern's three-day Flash Sale

The sale launched on Tuesday 30 September and ran until Thursday 2 October. We put three million tickets up for grabs at a price of just £2 for adults, and £1 for children.

New £46 million facility built to keep trains running for passengers opens in Yorkshire

A £46.5 million light maintenance depot has opened at Hillhouse Sidings in Huddersfield, part of the Transpennine Route Upgrade (TRU). The site, now operated by us, will maintain, repair, and clean trains, mostly overnight, to ensure smooth service for passengers.

The 24-hour facility includes five lines and can accommodate up to 24 carriages. Initially, engineers will work on diesel trains, with electric and bi-mode services to follow.

Northern's Rob Warnes called the depot "vital" for reliable services, while TRU's Paul Sumner highlighted its role in supporting a greener, more dependable railway.

The TRU is upgrading the 76-mile route between Manchester, Huddersfield, Leeds, and York. Huddersfield station has also reopened with extended platforms, with further upgrades continuing until early 2027.

'Transformative' station in Northumberland defies the odds to win World Cup of Stations

We've won the World Cup! Ashington station has been crowned the winner of this year's World Cup of Stations, voted the most life-changing in the UK. We secured 28.3% of the final vote, beating out major stations like London Waterloo and York, thanks to incredible support from our community, Northern staff, Northumberland County Council and local cricket hero Mark Wood.

Ashington, one of the country's newest stations, reopened last December after 60 years, reconnecting our town via the Northumberland Line. It's already transforming lives; giving us better access to jobs, education, and leisure, and helping drive regeneration in our former mining town.

We're thrilled to see Ashington recognised nationally and we're just getting started.
